



- 1. <u>Introductions</u>: Cynda Bruce, Coordinating Committee Vice-Chair, opened the meeting. Meeting attendees calling in:

- 2. Consent Calendar: Unanimously approved. (MR/JH)
  - ★ September 22, 2017 Meeting Minutes
  - ↓ <u>September 2017 Financial Report</u>—Because the website re-design was planned to be completed last year, it will show up as a negative expenditure on the monthly financials until the expenditures are reimbursed from the ODOT grant funds. Mary to get balance of website grant out to the partners.
  - 4 August 2017 Ridership Tracking—Through August there have been over 128,000 rides provided and 755,000 bus miles. Will want to do a press announcement when reach 1 million NW Connector miles.

# 3. STIP Transit Access Study

Have all the stops except Otter Rock completed, as it needs to be moved to Hwy 101. Need partners to confirm the stops look correct. Sunset—Yes. Columbia—Yes, although need to double check Clatskanie.

Draft Itinerary—Structured around partner availability. Day 1 will start in Astoria. Purpose: Assess needs, essential improvements. Don't expect partners will spend the entire time with the consultants, but at a minimum for the stops they own. Confirm schedule—All partners confirmed that the draft itinerary matched their schedules. Lee suggested that he drive separately, so the consultants can drive directly to their next stop. Ken and Donna will coordinate on how they get to the various locations. OK, if local officials join the group for stops in their community. Will need to wear visibility vests, and a hat. Can't walk out on sites without visibility equipment. Will need to find safe pullouts for stopping to look at access locations.

Assuming an average of 20 minutes per slot. If there are going to be delays, partners scheduled for the afternoon will receive a text regarding timing. Will be 4 consultants each day on the trip: Ryan, engineering, transit designer and environmental.

Safety—CH2M develops a safety plan for each project, which each partner will need to review and sign.

Travel Materials —CH2M Hill will be providing packets will be prepared including close-up aerial maps of each location, a second map will environmental information, field notes form for tracking information learned at each site, environmental scoping recording form. They will also send out maps electronically. Camera and notes are the most important.



Question: Since most of these are on state ROWs, knowing boundaries will be helpful. County parcel delineations will be downloaded, which will be accurate for this initial assessment. Will be helpful in understanding how large an improvement can be made, and conceptually how a stop will be designed.



## 4. NWACT Standing Items

- ➡ <u>Driver Training</u> (Cathy Bond)—Lincoln County: Field supervisor is working with Cathy on a date for their training. Expect to get done by the end of October. Benton: Will be coordinating with Cathy on a date and personnel to be trained. Columbia County: Cathy trained a subset of staff, who will be training the others. Most felt the training was very useful. A question was raised regarding using the Visitors Pass and getting off before arrive in Portland. Michael will clarify how the Visitor Pass works with his staff. Sunset—Newer drivers are all about customer service. Two classes, 12 drivers. Once showed them how easy it was to sell the Visitors Passes, much more supportive. Also liked new website and some have already used. A couple noticed a couple of errors on the routes on the website. Interesting to see there are similarities among veteran drivers across districts regarding their interest in the NW Connector.
- ↓ <u>IGA</u>—Easiest to do seems to be just updating the fiscal agent (from Columbia County to Tillamook County Transportation District). Columbia County's legal counsel (Robin) doesn't want to make any changes herself, and has asked that any changes be sent to the individual partners legal counsel. Ownership of the website if something were to happen to the NW Connector in the future may need to be figured out. Columbia County's IT and Thomas are discussing options. Wait until hear if there need to be any changes to the IGA related to the website before taking that one recommended change to the fiscal agent out to each of the partner boards.
- Marketing—Lee forwarded an additional email from Mary Burke regarding Maverick Media and whether she will be passing on her business to anyone (she's not). Most marketing companies are based out of Portland and are larger/pricier than she was. She will look around the Eugene area. Lee is having his daughter look into potential U of O journalism graduates. Thomas might know someone as well, eg, Selina Barlow. Mary will reach out to her to see if she knows of any resources.
- ★ Management Plan—Lincoln County: Approved through legal and will go on consent calendar this month. Benton: Taking to legal this month, with action by the Board of Commissioners in November or December. Columbia: Waiting until IGA gets resolved. Like Plan but want IGA adopted first. Looking around January for the Management Plan. Board of Commissioners wasn't crazy about Coordinated Transit Plan, but did approve. Biggest concern right now is budget lack of funding for transit.
- → <u>Swiftly</u>—Partners agreed to schedule a presentation at the November meeting with Cathy, Doug and Thomas when can do it in person. Is working well in Tillamook. Drivers don't have to worry about getting on the phone as to where they are. Bus location is online, helpful for fielding customer calls, reducing the number of investigations into bus stop complaints. Riders download the Swiftly app and track real time bus locations. If you have dead spots in it will predict where the bus will be when it emerges from the zone. It also provides history tracking internally. Tillamook was able to demo it for multiple months before purchasing. Swiftly provides all the equipment, transponders and satellite links. Unclear whether partners with transponders already will be able to use that existing equipment. Been really helpful in reducing number of rider calls.

Be a perfect STF discretionary grant application. Would really help with making connections between partner Connector routes. Would be a great joint application. January 19<sup>th</sup> deadline. More discussion at the November meeting. Mobility management category. Favor one-time grants rather than operating requests.

≠ <u>Tiger Application</u>—Not enough time to get it done this year. Too short of a timeframe and too complicated of an application. Will continue to collect information for an application next time, so will have a head start.

#### 1. Introduction

The Tillamook County Transportation District (hereafter "TCTD") and the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde (hereafter "CTGR"), through the leadership of the Tribal Council are entering into a purchased transportation agreement. The transit project will provide additional public transit services to CTGR members and the general public in Marion County, Polk County, Yamhill County and others traveling through Grand Ronde. (TCTD and CTGR are collectively referred to as the "Parties.")

# 2. Purpose

The purpose of this purchased transportation agreement is to provide Grand Ronde Express service addressing public transit needs between Grand Ronde and Salem and helping link Tillamook, Lincoln, Yamhill, Polk, and Marion counties. Moreover, it will set forth the roles and responsibilities of TCTD as the seller and provider of the specific services and CTGR as the buyer. Hereafter referred to as the "Project," the parties intend to use the funds to provide public transit services between Yamhill, Marion and, Polk counties by providing express bus route between Grand Ronde and Salem (hereafter the "Services"), a corridor heavily travelled by CTGR members.

# 3. Responsible Entities

Each Party to this agreement is a separate entity responsible for establishing its own policies and procedures, except where specifically discussed in this agreement.

#### 4. Term

The term of this agreement will run through June 30, 2019. The term may be extended by mutual agreement of the Parties, which must be executed in writing at least 90 days prior to the expiration of the current term.

# 5. Rights, Roles, and Responsibilities

## A. Tillamook County Transit District (TCTD) - Seller

- 1) TCTD will operate and manage the service or Project and assist CTGR with the coordination with interlining transit routes and providers.
- TCTD will provide the Services (described in greater detail in Exhibit B to this agreement) during the term of this agreement. Services will be expanded or curtailed based on written agreement of the Parties. In providing the Services, TCTD will operate and maintain its vehicles in accordance with TCTD's policies and procedures which are ODOT compliant.
- TCTD will provide information required for periodic financial reports on the Services to CTGR at intervals as required by funding agencies.

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- 4) TCTD will provide full cost information on the administrative cost, maintenance cost, and operating expenses (including fuel, vehicle maintenance cost, insurance, salaries and wages).
- TCTD will develop periodic operational reports on the Services including quarterly reports on the number of trips provided, number of passengers served, and similar information necessary to show the utility and value of the Project and meet federal requirements.
- TCTD will provide any additional information needed for reports to funding agencies as required by those agencies.
- 7) TCTD will ensure compliance with all applicable federal laws and regulations, and that all federal directives affecting Project implementation are followed. This agreement may be amended by mutual consent to conform with federal, state or local governmental guidelines. If such amendments result in a change in the funding, the scope of service or schedule of the activities to be undertaken as part of this agreement, such modification will be incorporated only by written amendment signed by all the Parties.
- 8) TCTD will monitor program income, defined as income generated from passengers on the Project route, and agrees that such income shall be used as a source of revenue to reduce the monthly invoices.
- 9) In carrying out the Services, TCTD will act in accordance with the applicable standards described in the certifications and assurances attached as Exhibit D to this agreement. TCTD will comply with applicable federal laws and regulations, including those listed at Exhibit D. Federal laws, regulations, and directives may change; where applicable, such changed requirements will apply to the Project.

# B. Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde (CTGR) - Buyer

- 1) CTRG agrees to pay TCTD up to \$265,320 in return for services as described in Exhibit C and this includes 100% of the cost of service. TCTD will retain fare revenue per Exhibit C.
- 2) CTGR will be invoiced by TCTD monthly for services provided.
- 3) CTGR agrees to obtain all necessary authorization or approvals to provide a location to park-out buses, provide bus stop signage as necessary to accommodate the Services. This may include the use of existing transit facilities and signage.
- 4) The buses employed will have Grand Ronde label and logo added to the bus wrap. CTGR will provide TCTD with the proposed image for mutual review and approval with both entities names shown on the



buses. Implementation of this change will occur within 90 to 120 days after the design has been agreed upon.

#### 6. General Terms

- A. Termination. This agreement may be immediately terminated by mutual consent of the Parties. If either Party wishes to terminate its participation in the Project, it may do so upon 90 days' written notice to the other Party.
- **B.** No Third Party Beneficiaries. TCTD and CTGR are the only parties to this agreement and are the only parties entitled to enforce its terms. Nothing in this agreement gives, is intended to give, or shall be construed to give or provide any benefit or right, whether directly or indirectly or otherwise, other third parties unless such third parties are individually identified by name herein and expressly described as intended beneficiaries of the terms of the agreement.
- C. **Indemnification.** To the fullest extent allowed by law, each Party releases and shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend the other Party, its elected officials, officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all costs, including costs of defense, claims, liability, judgments or awards of damages asserted or arising directly or indirectly from, on account of, or in connection with any error, omission, or act of negligence by the Party, its elected or appointed officials, officers, agents, or employees in the performance of its responsibilities under this agreement. Each Party agrees to promptly notify the other Party of the filing of any claim which the notifying Party believes is covered by the indemnity recited in this Section and shall not settle such claim without prior consent of the other Party, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. The indemnified Party shall have the right to participate in the defense of said claim to the extent of its own interest. Appropriate personnel of the indemnified Party shall cooperate and participate in legal proceedings if requested by the indemnifying Party, and/or required by a court of competent jurisdiction.
- D. **Dispute Resolution:** The undersigned representatives of each Party hereby affirm that they have entered into this agreement in good faith. Each Party agrees that it will discharge its obligations under this agreement in good faith. The Parties agree that they will work together and will endeavor to accomplish the purposes and goals of this agreement in a manner that serves the best interests of the Parties and the members of their communities. In the event of any dispute or disagreement in the implementation of this agreement, the Parties shall resolve the matter amicably by consultation or negotiation in the spirit of cordiality and mutual respect, beginning with the designated representatives of each entity involved in the dispute. If a dispute is not resolved within five business days of an issue being formally raised by one of the Parties, the dispute will be referred by the representatives to executive staff for the entities, who will endeavor in good faith to resolve the dispute. Final resolution of disputes may be referred for the joint consideration and negotiation by the governing body of any parties involved in a dispute.

E. Notices. When written notice is required under this agreement, it shall be given in writing by personal delivery, facsimile, email, or mailing the same, postage prepaid, to the other Party at the address or number set forth below. Any communication or notice personally delivered shall be deemed to be given when actually delivered. Any communication or notice delivered by facsimile shall be deemed to be given when receipt of the transmission is generated by the transmitting machine. Any communication by email shall be deemed to be given when the recipient of the email personally acknowledges receipt of the email. Any notice mailed shall be deemed to be received three days after the date it is deposited in the U.S. Mail.

- F. Limitations. Except as otherwise expressly identified in this agreement, no Party may act on the other's behalf or obligate the other Party in contract, debt or otherwise. The Parties are and shall remain separate entities, and no partnership, joint venture, or agency relationship is created by this agreement.
- G. Severability. If any term or provision of this agreement is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or in conflict with any law, the validity of the remaining terms and provisions shall not be affected, and the rights and obligations of the Parties shall be construed and enforced as if this agreement did not contain the particular term or provision held to be invalid.
- H. Integration and Waiver. This agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties on the subject matter hereof. There are no understandings, agreements, or representations, oral or written, not specified herein regarding this agreement. The delay or failure of either Party to enforce any provision of this agreement shall not constitute a waiver by that Party of that or any other provision. Each Party, by the signature below of its authorized representative, hereby acknowledges that it has read this agreement, understands it, and agrees to be bound by its terms and conditions.

- I. Counterparts. This agreement may be executed in counterparts (by facsimile or otherwise), each of which is an original and all of which together are deemed one agreement binding on both Parties, notwithstanding that both Parties are not signatories to the same counterpart.
- J. Effective Date. This agreement shall become effective on the date when this agreement is fully executed and approved as required by applicable law.

### BUS SERVICE BETWEEN GRAND RONDE AND SALEM:

TCTD will operate commuter service between Grand Ronde and the Cherriots Transit Mall in Salem. The bus service will consist of up four (4) daily round trips five (5) days per week except for the following holidays: New Years, Memorial, Independence, Labor, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

### MARKETING:

CTGR will market the bus service, with the goal of increasing awareness and ridership of the bus service. This includes information on the scheduled service on the Tribal website and links to provide connection to other transit services.

CTGR may join with other regional transit agencies in marketing efforts including TCTD as well as Yamhill County Transit Area, Salem Area Mass Transit District, and the Lincoln County Transportation District.

#### **FARES & REVENUE**

### Grand Ronde to Salem:

Effective January 2, 2018 to June 30, 2019, CTGR will provide up to \$265,320 in payments for these eighteen months to fund 3,316.5 revenue service hours. The service hours will consist of weekday (M-F) commuter transit services between Grand Ronde and the Cherriots Transit Mall in Salem. In total 100% of the cost of service will be provided by CTGR.

TCTD will charge fares which are estimated to amount to 14% \$37,145 for the period. TCTD will report out their fare revenue to CTGR in their monthly invoices and the balance of the costs is estimated to be \$228,175. If fare revenue is less CTGR will cover the balance. If fare revenue is more than invoices will reflect that in smaller invoices to CTGR.

### Fare Policy:

Grand Ronde Tribal members of the CTGR may use the Grand Ronde Express service free of charge upon presentation of a valid Tribal Identification Card or other official documentation showing proof of the person's status as a Grand Ronde tribal member. What about Siletz Tribal members? They will be allowed to ride Route 6 with their Cards and if they are not permitted to ride Route 7 it could cause some confusion. We can deal with it but thought I should bring this up for consideration.

- 6. Executive Session: Discipline of Public Officers and Employees, ORS 192.660(2)(b) \*\*Executive Session\*\* 6:34pm 6:52pm

Board Chair Judy Riggs read aloud the following information:

The Tillamook County Transportation District Board of Directors will now meet in executive session for the purpose of discussion specific to Discipline of Public Officers and Employees, ORS 192.660(2)(b). Representatives of the news media and designated staff shall be allowed to attend the executive session. All other members of the audience are asked to leave the room. Representatives of the news media are specially directed not to report on any of the deliberations during the executive session, except to state the



general subject of the session as previously announced. No decisions will be made during executive session.

There are no motions as a result of executive session.

### **REPORTS**

- 7. Information: General Managers Report:
  - a. Financial Report: GM Doug Pilant reviewed the September 2017 financial reports. District is 25% through the Fiscal Year. Director Huffman requested an explanation for the Innova Legal, Ecolane, Maverick Media and Tillamook Computers expenses. GM Doug Pilant explained Innova expenses are for personnel legal fees, Ecolane is for the dispatching and scheduling software, Maverick Media is NWOTA marketing expenses, and Tillamook Computers was for IT expenses.
  - b. Service Performance Report: YTD Ridership overall was -6.4% over the previous year. The YTD cost per trip was +15.5% while the cost per hour was +7.6%, and the fare box return was -2.4%. Director Hanenkrat asked why ridership is down. GM Doug Pilant reported trend is down nationwide. Director Huffman suggested that perhaps the Board can help with marketing.
  - c. Northwest Oregon Transit Alliance: GM Doug Pilant reviewed the NWOTA meeting agenda, minutes, finance report with the Board. The group will be conducting a field trip October 25-27. Director Huffman asked what improvement would be needed in Hebo. GM Doug Pilant explained there is already a southbound bus stop where people get off the bus and that we're working with ODOT to establish a northbound bus stop, which is where people get onto the bus.
  - d. Planning & Development:
    - i. Cape Kiwanda Master Plan: Kittleson & Associates was selected as the project consultant.
    - ii. Neskowin Bus Stop: Pad and shelter is installed. Waiting for approval from ODOT for a water meter for landscape watering.
    - iii. Cloverdale Bus Stop: The County said they are planning to abandon this project due to sufficient funding and other constraints to the site. The County's Chief of Staff told GM Doug Pilant the Board of Commissioners is considering turning this property over to the District. GM Doug Pilant said the District already invested at least \$7,000 into the project so it may not be a bad idea to take control of the property and work with ODOT at a later date to develop the site into a viable bus stop. Director Hanenkrat asked if the property is environment clearance. GM Doug Pilant said the County has already turned over all of the environmental records and said they'll do one more check with DEQ to verify that the property is free and clear of any issues. GM Doug Pilant also reported the County is going to determine if any of the previous ODOT grant funding that's been used will impact how the property is developed. Director Hoffman did hear that there were concerns about the bank erosion. GM Doug Pilant said that is one of the constraints making it harder to develop the property. Merrianne Hoffman said there is a movement in Cloverdale to create a business association separate

from the Pacific City Nestucca Valley Chamber of Commerce. She also reported the community viewed the wayside as a place to have a public restroom to get people to stop and look around the town and spend money at their businesses.

iv. Coastal Connector Expansion of Services: GM Doug Pilant said staff has made great progress developing schedules and a service plan to improve services between Lincoln City and Salem. The implementation date is January 2, 2018.

### e. Grant Funding:

- i. STF Grant: Ford Transit stretcher vans delivered and NWOTA Coordinating Committee working on final details of the regional website.
- ii. Section 5310 Grant: The District is going to support Marie Mills for a competitive grant to purchase a vehicle.

### f. Facility/Property Management:

- Tillamook Family Counseling Center hired a contractor to develop a plan to renovate the vacant office space. Expect a written proposal in the near future.
- ii. Lighting project: The lighting materials arrived, and the Outdoor Lighting project will be completed within the next few weeks.
- iii. Renovation: Progress continues. New roof and gutters have been installed, the flat roof will soon be completed, and the contractor will be installing HVAC units and turning their attention to completing their attention to the new offices. There were 4 change orders with additional costs and credits. The difference will be an additional cost of \$675. Most of the additional expense was to remove the dry-rot on the NE portion of the roof.

### g. Miscellaneous:

- i. ITS: Terminated the contract with Tillamook Computers and issued their final check.
- ii. Scheduling and Dispatching Software: Working on client data cleanup, automatic downloads from Ride Care, service area map being developed. Still planning to go live at the beginning of 2018.
- iii. US 101/OR 6 Project: Sidewalk project is delayed until mid-November. TCTD will continue to provide shuttle service for approximately 6 weeks. Director Huffman asked about the opinion in the paper about the shuttle not working, but the District has no record of missing any calls on the cell phone provided.
